- 1. Which are the main trends in the globalization process that could have a more serious impact in the capacity of the nation-state to play its traditional economic role in the future?
- 2. What lessons can we draw from the recent experiences in regionalization, i.e. European Union, NAFTA ASEAN and Mercosur?
- 3. What lessons can we draw from the experiences of federal states?
- 4. Should we talk of "decline" or of "redefinition" of the traditional economic role of the nation-state as we have known it in the recent decades?
- 5. If redefinition is the issue, which are the fields of public economic policies that should be adapted to the new realities of economic, political and cultural globalization?
- 6. How could we develop at the global and regional levels collective disciplines that contemplate common interests of nation-states with different degrees of economic development?
- 7. Cultural diversification is a positive or a negative factor in the development of a more stable, pluralistic and democratic global economic and trade system?
- 8. What kind of global and regional institutions are more suitable in the new era of economic globalization?; Is the "supranational" concept the only reasonable option for the future?; In that case how can they assure the democratic values in the international or regional system?
- 9. Could strengthening national and local identities be the logical answer to challenges and opportunities of a new era of globalization and regionalization?
