

The authors provide a brief history, an analysis of the politics of equalization as witnessed over the last fifteen years, and a discussion of key economic debates concerning the role of the program and its effects.

They also explore the relationship between equalization and other components of fiscal federalism, particularly the Canada Health Transfer and the Canada Social Transfer. The result is an analysis that draws from the best scholarship available in the fields of economics, economic history, political science, political sociology, and public policy.

Dr. André Lecours est Professeur titulaire à l'École d'études politiques de l'Université d'Ottawa. Ses intérêts de recherche principaux sont la politique canadienne, la politique européenne, le nationalisme et le fédéralisme. Il a dirigé *New Institutionalism. Theory and Analysis* (University of Toronto Press, 2005), rédigé *Basque Nationalism and the Spanish State* (University of Nevada Press, 2007) et co-rédigé (avec Daniel Béland) *Nationalism and Social Policy. The Politics of Territorial Solidarity* (Oxford University Press, 2008).



Dr. Daniel Béland est titulaire de la Chaire de recherche du Canada en politiques publiques à la Johnson-Shoyama Graduate School of Public Policy. Un spécialiste des politiques sociales et fiscales, il a publié plus de 15 ouvrages et 120 articles dans des revues avec comité de lecture. En plus de l'ouvrage sur la péréquation lancé aujourd'hui, ses livres les plus récents incluent *Advanced Introduction to Social Policy* (2016; avec Rianne Mahon) et *Obamacare Wars*: (2016; avec Philip Rocco et Alex Waddan).



Dr. Gregory Marchildon currently holds an Ontario Research Chair in Health Policy and System Design with the Institute of Health Policy, Management and Evaluation at the University of Toronto. Prior to this, he served as a Canada Research Chair in Public Policy and Economic History, and professor in the Johnson-Shoyama Graduate School of Public Policy at the University of Regina. Dr. Marchildon is also a fellow of the Canadian Academy of Health Sciences, a founding member of the Pan-Canadian Health Reform Analysis Network (PHRAN) and associate editor of PHRAN's journal, the *Health Reform Observer – Observatoire des Réformes de Santé*. He is also Canada's representative to the European Observatory on Health Systems and Policies' networked platform, the *Health Systems and Policy Monitor* (www.hspm.org).



Dr. Haizhen Mou primary research interests include health care financing and expenditure, cost and efficiency of public sectors, and government budget management, often from a political economy perspective. She received a SSHRC grant and several other awards. Her main teaching responsibilities include *Public Finance* and *Quantitative Research Method* for graduate students. She has supervised five Ph.D. or MPP students and served on numerous graduate thesis committees. She volunteered as a board member for a local non-profit organization focusing on seniors.
