



The negotiations of Germany's Federalism Reform II will enter a decisive stage in 2008. In addition to financial issues, modernizing the administration will also be on the agenda. Synergy potentials are intended to open up through increases in effectiveness.

An important way to increase effectiveness is benchmarking of public administrations. The structure of a federal state offers the possibility of competition; however, competition needs comparisons, otherwise it would be meaningless. The importance of benchmarking at various state levels was underlined by past PISA surveys conducted by the OECD. One of the objectives of the Federalism Reform II is to establish benchmarking as a general tool also in other areas.

Many federal states have had experience with benchmarking. In October 2007 the Federal Republic of Germany joined the Forum of Federations, an international non-governmental organization headquartered in Ottawa, Canada. The Forum offers a unique opportunity to introduce international experience into the reform debate.

On 15 February 2007 the Federal Ministry of the Interior and the Forum of Federations will host a workshop on benchmarking in public administrations of federal states at the Federal Ministry of the Interior, Berlin, Alt-Moabit 101D, room 1.071. Speakers from Australia, Switzerland, Canada, the United States and Germany will inform about their countries' experience.
